



Family Resources gets \$30,500 donation

Funding will help with annual Secret Santa program

GRAFTON, W.Va. (WV News) — Taylor County Family Resources received a grand donation, just in time

Family Resources Ex-ecutive Director Cathy Coontz-Griffith said she was blown away when she learned the total dollar amount associated with the donation from The Farmer Family Foundation.
"I was contacted by Mi-

ing for charity to help support this year, they had set-tled on us," Coontz-Griffith said. "I told them we are al-

ways happy to re-ceive donations, but I had no idea the awesome amount they were about to provide."



She said she received word that through Arsenal Resources LLC, in conjunc-tion with The Farmer Family Foundation, that Taylor County Family Resources was the recipient of \$30,500.

"I was astonished! When I first saw the total, I thought that it wasn't correct," Coontz-Griffith said. "I was completely flabbergasted, but mainly I was touched."

In June, Arsenal Resources, along with The Farmer its annual charity golf outing at Pete Dye Golf Club. That raised approximately \$60,000 that they then donated to three causes.

Brown told Coontz-Grif-fith that Taylor Coun-ty Family Resources had been selected because Arsenal and the foundation took note of all the services the charitable entity pro-vides for the residents of

the county.
"She said they were pretty impressed with how many people we were able to serve and the things that we strive to do for the com-munity," Coontz-Griffith munity," Coontz-Griffith said. "Because of our out-reach, Michelle said that they thought that we were very worthy cause."

The funding came at a time that it was needed the most, as Coontz-Griffith re-ported there had been a de-lay in grant funding that provides money for the ma-

We were limited in funding due to a backlog in grants, causing strain on some of our services. We were really concerned that we may have to let some individuals go, but by the grace of God, we were able to keep things afloat," Coontz-Grif-fith said. "Though this generous contribution, we were able to get everything back on track. And since then, our grant funding has come through, too.

With the generous contribution from Arsenal and the foundation, Family Re-sources will be able to stock their food and hygiene pantries. And, in keeping with the magic and giving feel-ing of the season, the charitable entity also will be able to provide extra Christmas

cheer to families this year.

"We are in our 10th year of hosting our Secret Santa program, and this year,



through this amazing donation, we are going to be able to serve 36 kids this Christ-" Coontz-Griffith said. "And on top of that, some of funds will be used to provide holiday dinners to 30 fami-

She shared that Family Resources works alongside the schools in the county to assess which students are in the most need. Then, they provide them with a warm outfit, undergarments and socks, a coat, boots and something they are inter-ested in, usually like art stuff, a little toy or some-

thing that they will like.
"We feel so blessed to have received this donation from The Farmer Family Foundation and Arsenal," Coontz-Griffith said. "We just want to say thank you

International Mother's Day Shrine to host holiday open house

GRAFTON, W. Va. (WV News) — The public is invited to a Christmas open house at the historic In-ternational Mother's Day Shrine from 1-4 p.m. on

Sunday, December 17. This National Historic Landmark structure, at 11 East Main Street, downtown, is where the first official Mother's Day service was conducted in 1908 at the request of the holiday's founder. Anna Jarvis.

The Shrine grounds feature the community Christmas tree and other holiday decorations. The interior of the Shrine is also decorated for the Christmas season.

While may visitors come

from outside of the community to visit the local historic landmark, it is surprising to International Mother's Day Shrine Board Mem-ber Marvin Gelhausen how many locals have never been inside the historic building.

'If you need a break from holiday shopping, visiting the Shrine's holiday decorations can give you a break from the rigors of the holiday season," he said. "Listening to familiar and favorite Christmas tunes played on the Shrine's pipe organ can be a relaxing retreat from holiday crowds packed into area shopping

Gelhausen said individuals won't want to miss this

late-in-the-season tunity to tour the Mother's Day Shrine.

While Shrine tours can while Shrine tours can be scheduled throughout the year, the Shrine will not be open regularly un-til April 2024. The Shrine stops regular open hours from late fall through ear-

spring," he explained. The entry-level lecture room also features a large collection of historic Grafton photos, many reflecting how the city looked when Anna Jarvis was growing up in Grafton and was influenced by the work of her mother, Ann Reeves Jarvis, who taught Sunday School at the church for a quarter of a century.

Episcopal Church was dedicated in 1873 and served as a house of worship until 1967, when the congrega-tion moved to the Church of the Good Shepherd. A nonprofit was chartered in 1962 and took ownership of the former church building, transforming it into an international shrine to all mothers everywhere and a memorial to Anna Jarvis and Ann Reeves Jarvis.

No church congrega-tion has met weekly at the Shrine since the Andrews congregation left in 1967.

Today, it is used for community events and func-tions, hosts the annual Mother's Day observance, and is a community trea-sure everyone should visit.

Judge Hoxie deems Grafton woman danger to the community

GRAFTON, W.Va. (WV News) — After voicing that he felt like a defendant was playing a game with the

risk, Judge Thomas Hox-ie returned Sarina Lynn Frye to the Tygart Valley Regional Jail to await sentencing.
Frye, 19, of Grafton was

playing a game with the present with her counsel, court system, potentially Dean Morgan, to enter a putting the community at guilty plea to four counts

of driving impaired serious injury. For each

count, facing potential



of 2-10 years in prison, mandatory fine of \$1,000-\$3,000 and the loss of her driver's license for a period of five years, or for a period of time conditioned on participation in the test and lock program.

The negotiated plea

The negotiated plea agreement requested that a presentence investigation be completed before the matter would be set down for sentencing.

Taylor County Prosecuting Attorney John Bord said the state would recommend that counts one and two would be served consecutively with one another, but they would be served concurrently with counts three and four.

court that she had been underage drinking and smoking marijuana at a party the night before and had consumed approximately 10 beers and an unknown

amount of vodka. "When I woke up the next morning, I thought I was sober, but, clearly, I was not," she said.

Aside from that morning, Frye said she doesn't recollect a lot of what happened during and following the incident, citing that she had "hit her head a lot during the wreck." Four individuals, including a juvenile, were injured because of her

that a report had been sub-mitted to the court concerning bond violations that needed addressed. The report alleged that Frye had tested positive for alcohol

"The court received a report on Oct. 12 that you had tested positive on Oct. 3," he said. "It says that you de-nied usage, giving the reason for the positive because you had taken cough syrup, used mouthwash and drank a hot toddy. However, your blood alcohol was extremely high. Too high for the items you have claimed to

have been using." Frye told the court that she had used cough syrup to fall asleep because she was "going into a manic ep-isode," and that while in the manic state, she could have consumed alcohol without knowing it.

"This court is concerned with your excuses and your honesty. This is not a game You are 19 and should not be drinking at all. ... This court simply does not believe you, and it believes
